North Central District Health Department regrettably is announcing two deaths in Spencer County, one death in Shelby County, and one death in Henry County due to complications from the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19). Sixty-one new lab-confirmed cases in Shelby, Henry, Trimble, and Spencer Counties, increasing the district case count to 7,414. One hundred eight monitored by North Central District have been released from isolation.

Shelby County, KY – Spencer County has had two COVID-19 related deaths in two adult African American females with underlying conditions; our hearts and prayers go out to their family and friends.

Shelby County has had another COVID-19 related death in an elderly Caucasian female with underlying conditions; our hearts and prayers go out to her family and friends.

Henry County has had another COVID-19 related death in an adult Caucasian male with underlying conditions; our hearts and prayers go out to his family and friends.

North Central District Health Department has sixty-one cases that tested positive for the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19).

North Central District released one hundred eight individuals from isolation; sixty-one from Shelby County, twenty from Spencer County, nineteen from Henry County and eight from Trimble County monitored their symptoms and complied with a self-isolation agreement with the Health Department.
